

Tree & Shrub Planting Basics

Description:

• General guide to properly planting a tree or shrub.

Tip Sheet #4

Functions/Benefits:

- Roots stabilize soil.
- Native plants provide wildlife habitat.
- Trees reduce heating and cooling costs:

- Evergreen trees planted on north side of home can reduce energy costs by blocking winter wind.

- Deciduous trees (leaves fall off in winter) planted on south side of home can reduce energy costs by blocking summer sun.

- Plants helps clean the air.
- Adds beauty and color to your yard.
- Adds value to your home.

Recommendations:

- Location is important. Avoid overhead & underground utilities.

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Tree & Shrub Planting Basics Tip Sheet #4

How to plant a tree or shrub:

- 1. Dig hole 2-3 times the width of the root ball but same depth as root ball.
- 2. Remove the container or any plastic or string around the root ball.
- 3. Place tree or shrub in hole and keep straight. Root flare should be flush with final grade.
- 4. Fill the hole with soil, and firmly (but gently) pack the soil.
- 5. Water thorough and slowly. First year after planting water approximately 15 gallons per week. Check soil with finger do not water if soil is moist/cool.
- 6. Mulch around base of tree or shrub. Do not let mulch touch base of plant stem (keep mulch 2-4 inches from stem).
- 7. If you use stakes & wire/hose or other supports, remove them after 1 year so they do not girdle (cut) tree trunk/stem.
